

Why the scandal of child poverty must end - and how we need to fix it

Meet Aya, 11, baby Kyrell, one, Forest, and Isaac, 10. These beautiful children represent some of the 104,433 young people living in poverty in Birmingham.









Almost half of our city's children are growing up in real, sustained poverty. In the city's most deprived neighbourhoods, three in every four youngsters are affected.

For a city which proudly touts its credentials as 'the youngest in Europe', with a quarter of a million aged under 16 (23.4% of our population), we have to face up to a hard truth. We are failing our children.

Forged in the fires of Conservative austerity, when a billion pounds was stripped from local budgets over 14 years, and exacerbated by welfare cuts, rising costs, low pay and widening inequality, child poverty has gripped Birmingham.














Where do you tend to get your news broken down by age (%)

Dead hand of Treasury ...

"Treasury officials are accustomed to departments presenting overly optimistic spending proposals and so request stronger evidence that a proposed new intervention will work, which departments often feel is hard to provide.

"This leads to the perception among departments that there is a higher evidential bar for new programmes than for existing ones. As one interviewee put it: 'Who's doing the business case for the status quo?'"

Keep it Simple



Anything we say should be said in simple, understandable language.




Do not use obscure words, jargon or acronyms.



Always write as if you were talking to a year 6 student (10 years old)



If you need to read a sentence twice it is either too long or too complicated.



An early evaluation of the programme demonstrated that:

- Occupational therapists offered self-management interventions in 76 per cent of cases, compared with five per cent offered by the GP.
- In 67 per cent of cases, GP appointment/s were avoided, either because an occupational therapist was able to complete the appointment or because follow-up appointments were not needed.
- In 26 per cent of cases, a referral to the community mental health team was avoided.

Over a five-month period, working one day per week in the project, the occupational therapists saw 386 patients. The projected average cost-saving per person who saw an occupational therapist was £327.59.


We estimate that the total number of children living in kinship care arrangements in England is 132,818.

Janet, 69, and her husband Peter, 71, have raised their 12-year-old grandson since he was 18 months old as his parents weren't able to look after him.

The Sheffield couple have a Child Arrangements Order but have never received any financial, therapeutic or emotional support from social services to help them care for their grandson. Janet says their grandson also has learning difficulties (ADHD), yet they cannot get any support for his educational or emotional needs from their local authority.

"I was 58 when my grandson came to live with us. He was 18 months old, and I still had two of my adopted children living in the house. I was the breadwinner but I needed to be at home with him. My work, which I loved, said there was no way I could go part-time. So I left my job to care for my grandson. I lost both income and some of my pension by leaving suddenly like that, but I had no choice. I got no financial support whatsoever. We've been raising him on our pensions ever since."
