

Practical approach toolkit: Centralising recruitment overview

Who is the toolkit for?

It's for adult social care providers seeking to strengthen recruitment, induction and early retention.

It's designed for organisations facing workforce shortages, high turnover, inconsistent onboarding or limited HR capacity. It offers a practical, scalable model based on Sheffcare's approach to centralising recruitment and creating a smoother, more supportive candidate journey.

What the toolkit offers

The model shows how a values led, centrally supported approach can modernise recruitment and onboarding across care services by:

- establishing a consistent, well governed system that improves responsiveness, compliance and candidate experience.
- streamlining the application journey through clearer processes, structured interviews and timely communication.
- strengthening early support for new starters through standardised induction and named buddying.
- building a foundation for long term workforce development through accessible progression routes and targeted training.

Why this approach matters

Growing recruitment pressures and fragmented practices are increasingly affecting service quality. Many managers balance recruitment with day-to-day operational responsibilities, slowing down processes and reducing capacity to support new starters. Variable induction experiences can leave recruits unprepared, while delayed responses and limited structure cause strong candidates to accept roles elsewhere.

Key features include:

- **Central HR co-ordination:** A dedicated team manages advertising, screening and compliance, ensuring consistency and reducing administrative pressure.
- **Structured induction:** A three-day programme equips new starters with essential knowledge, confidence and a shared grounding in organisational values.
- **Buddy support:** Trained buddies offer practical guidance and reassurance, helping new staff settle in and build early connections.
- **Localised staffing:** Applicants are matched to nearby homes to reduce travel barriers and support reliability, satisfaction and retention.

Overarching lessons

- **Speed matters:** Timely engagement keeps candidates interested and reduces dropouts.
- **Consistency builds confidence:** Shared systems and expectations create fairness and strengthen organisational reputation.
- **Structured induction transforms retention:** A well-designed onboarding period supports confidence, clarity and early stability.
- **Local hiring strengthens stability:** Recruiting close to home improves reliability, belonging and work-life balance.
- **Simple systems scale best:** Practical tools such as trackers and templates maintain quality without over-complicating processes.
