Next steps to put People at the Heart of Care



On 4 April 2023, the government published 'Next steps to put people at the heart of care' – a two-year plan for adult social care reform which sets out detail on how we will implement our 2021 white paper commitments to improve the adult social care system.



This includes investing over £100 million over the next 2 years to:



 Drive rapid adoption of digital social care records (DSCRs) to enable secure information sharing across health and care services and free up time for care staff and managers



- 2. Test, evaluate and scale technologies based on local priorities, building the evidence base for future investment
- 3. Support care providers to boost their digital readiness, including digital skills, connectivity and cyber security to give the social care workforce the confidence, skills, support and infrastructure to effectively use technology to provide high quality care.

Alongside the *Next Steps* publication, the Digitising Social Care (DiSC) programme launched **Adult Social Care Technology Fund** for 2023/2024 to test and evaluate technologies that address local priorities and support the following outcomes:



1. Improve **care quality and safety** (including safe discharge from hospital)



2. Reduce avoidable admissions/readmissions to hospital



3. Support people to live independently in their own home





- Funding will be used by local areas to cover staffing resource needed to support the work throughout the test period, cost of any technology and licenses, and implementation costs required to set up the technology.
- We also expect at least 20% of the funding to cover local evaluation and benefits mapping.

What Good Looks Like (WGLL) For Adult Social Care

In People at the Heart of Care the government committed to developing advice on 'what good looks like' for social care technology to support digital working in adult social care (ASC).



- WGLL for ASC is an aspirational framework; providing a set of collective goals for local authorities and care providers to work towards.
- The guidance is organised around the 7
 WGLL themes to describe digital working, including 'support workforce'.
- The Digital Skills Framework is the first of several planned supporting resources to help care organisations implement the principles in WGLL for ASC.







Digital Skills Framework



- The <u>Digital Skills Framework</u> is a free resource to help support the development of digital skills across the adult social care workforce.
- It defines seven key areas of effective digital working, organised in two 'levels': 'digital skills for all staff', and 'go further' with digital skills.
- The framework can be used by social care employers to help with planning staff training or by individuals for their personal development.

Level 5 Digital Leadership Award

- Skills for Care were successful in being awarded a contract by DHSC to develop a Level 5 Digital Leadership Award.
- The Award will be equivalent to 110 hours of learning.
- We have run several focus groups with a variety of adult social care providers from across England to develop the Award
- The development of the award has now finished.
- DHSC are hopeful that the award will become available in Spring 2024







Digital Leadership: a four-day programme





The Digital leadership programme is a national development between Skills for Care and The National Care Forum for both new and experienced managers of adult social care services.

- The learning programme will support managers to gain the underpinning skills and knowledge of digital leadership that can be practically applied when implementing technology in a care service.
- The four-day programme is delivered virtually over a sixweek period and the objectives of the programme are:
 - The digital basics
 - Leadership and transformational change
 - Co-production
 - Using data to create change
